









Makuru is one of the six seasons in the Noongar seasonal calendar, observed by the Noongar people of the southwest of Western Australia. Occurring during the months of June and July, Makuru marks the coldest and wettest time of the year, and is known as the season of fertility.

During Makuru, the landscape undergoes a dramatic transformation. The skies darken with heavy clouds, and the first major rains of the year begin to fall. These rains are vital, replenishing the land and preparing it for new growth. The cooler temperatures and increased rainfall signal a time of abundance and renewal in the natural world.

This season is also a time of pairing and nesting for many native animals. Birds such as the djidi djidi (willy wagtail) and wardong (crow) begin to build nests and prepare for breeding. The appearance of certain flowers, like the Moodjar (WA Christmas Tree), also signals the shift in season.

For the Noongar people, Makuru was traditionally a time to move inland, away from the coast, to take advantage of the changing food sources. Hunting became more prominent, with kangaroos and other animals more easily tracked in the wet earth. Tools and weapons were also crafted during this time, as the cooler weather made for ideal working conditions.

Makuru is deeply connected to the cycles of the land and the wisdom of living in harmony with nature. It reminds us of the importance of observing and respecting seasonal changes, and of the deep knowledge held by the Noongar people about their environment.

The Enhanced Aboriginal Engagement Team at North Metropolitan TAFE (North Metro TAFE) plays a crucial role in supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. This team is part of the broader Koolark Centre for Aboriginal Students, which provides a welcoming and culturally safe environment for Indigenous students.

The Enhanced Aboriginal Engagement Team focuses on assisting disengaged Aboriginal youth aged 15 to 25 years. They offer a range of services, including career and course guidance, job search assistance, and general mentoring. The team works closely with schools, communities, and industries to help Aboriginal youth become job-ready.

The team provides specialised services such as resume writing, interview preparation, and ongoing study support. One of their key initiatives is the Koomba Birdal (Big Spark) program, which aims to ignite the potential of young Indigenous students by providing them with the skills and support needed to succeed in their chosen careers.

By offering these tailored services, the Enhanced Aboriginal Engagement Team helps bridge the gap between education and employment for Aboriginal youth, ensuring they have the tools and confidence to pursue their goals and contribute positively to their communities.
